10.00. INFLUENCE OF THE ARYANS

The Rabhas are highly inflenced by the Aryans of the Brahmaputra Valley. Their social life and social customs are losing original colour. Such changes are very prominant and quite noticeable in their day to day. 16 This changes is noticed in all groups of the Rabhas. But the Pati Rabha group is highly influenced by the Aryans than any other groups. So, anti-aryan characterististics are less stongly marked among the Pati Rabhas. Their language, social lives and social customs are aryanised. They forget their forfather's language. They speak a language which is blended by the Rabha and Assamese language. This language is called 'RABHAMESE'17. They have folk literature in this mixed language. This folk literature is very

SOCIO - ECONOMIC AND POLITICAL STATUS OF WOMEN OF THE MINORITY COMMUNITY IN THE SOUTH KAMRUP

Dr. Praneswar Nath Lecturer Dept. of Political Science

Assam is a land of composite multi - ethnic, multi - lingual State. It is meeting place of various ethnical groups with different cultural traditions. The same trend is vivid in the South Kamrup, too. As a part of Assam South Kamrup is inhabited by different communities. Certain areas are predominated by tribal people like the Rabha, Garo, Kachari etc. Other areas are occupied by non-tribal people, viz. several Hindu castes and Muslims. It is to be noted that the immigrant Muslims merely form a sizeable population as a 'Minority Community' in the South Kamrup.

My study reveals the importance of the location of the South Kamrup which represents a very diverse society. It is bounded by the mighty Brahmaputra in the north and by the Garo and Khasi Hills in the South. The district of Goalpara is in the west while the district of Nagaon makes the east. Its low lying areas are prone to flood .People, here, are accoustomed to live with the course of nature . Again, Guwahati, the only city of north - east, is located in this region . A few other semi urban pockets are also rapidly growing .The remaining parts are rural and forest areas.

They Muslim of the Brahmaputra valley are socially devided into two groups - indigenous muslims and immigrant muslims. The former made their settlements even much before the Britishraj. The enjoy a privileged position by making singular contributions to the Assamese culture. Their mother tongue is Assamese. Besides language, there are many other socio-

cultural similarities in between the Assamese Hindus and the Assamese muslims of the Brahmaputra valley. In contrast, the immigrant muslims are late comers into the valley. They basically constitute the agrarian section of the society. They also serve as the labour force of the State. They do not enjoy the same social status with the **Assamese muslims**.

As defined and used by the politicians and social scientists, the immigrant muslims form a religious and linguistic minority group within the larger social frame work of the South Kamrup. This community forms the poorest section in this area under my study. They are also politically less powerfull in comparison to the other advanced sections of the society.

The area covers an area of 325 sq. kms. with a population of 1,54,743 according to the **2001 Census**. The study area consists of three constituencies, Boko, Chhaygaon, Palasbari with five police stations (Thanas). It has only five revenue circles (i.e., Palasbari, Chhaygaon, Chamaria, Nagarbera and Boko) under Guwahati sub-division. According to Census report, 2001, the population pattern for each of three constituencies are as follows:

In (48) Boko constituency (sc): Hindu 61.22%; Indigenous Muslim 10.65% and immigrant Muslim 28.65%. In (49) Chhaygaon constituency: Hindu 65.35%, Indigenous Muslim 8.75% and immigrant Muslim 12.68%. In (50) Palasbari constituency: Hindu 75.10%, Indigenous Muslim 20.56% and immigrant Muslim 8.65%.

The position of women in traditional muslim society was influenced by the teachings of the **Quran** and the instructions of the **Prophet**. The customs, prevalent in Muslim society also played an another important role in giving the status to women. **Islam** gives an equitable

position to women.

It is to be noted that the South Kamrup being interior and inhabited by the Muslim immigrant community, has apparently no impact of modernization upon its people. Women of this community are not at all conscious about their own rights and deteriorating quality of life due to lack of education . Education is still a distant dream for most of the women folk here. Hardly 10 -16 persent amongst them are literate. The literacy rate amongst their female part is still more pathatic . Educational backwardness of the immigrant Muslim women is mainly due to prevalence of the system of **purda** in the South Kamrup . Moreover, subordination to fathers. husbands and brothers, early marriage, and their assingned tasks of being domestic.

The educational status of immigrant Muslim women is highly depressing and disheartening. Women of this community in char areas are mainly considered tools for child birth and maintaining household chores. Besides households chores, the women help the male counterparts in the paddy fields. On the other hand, both women and men are totally ignorant of birth control policies. As a results the population of the char areas is increasing at a alarming rate.

Depending on the socio -economic status, char women engage herself in a number of activities, which may be categorised under six broad headings. They are domestic work.

child care, cash earning activities, post hearvest activities, rest and recreation and others.

Status of women in this community depends upon the nature of its economy, attitude of the society towards women, social and religious taboos and women's own awareness. The level of economic equality and independence are the real indicators to measure the status of women in the community. It is observed that the impact of the flood and erosion upon the inhabitation is tremendous. The two factors are mainly responsible for the

economic backwardness of the area.

South Kamrup generally are not the active members of any political party. Voting behaviour of the women is neither linked with political mobilization nor with political socialization but with their household's political beliefs and attitudes.

Women of the minority community in the South Kamrup are not independent voters. A majority of them are illiterate. So they have no information and political awareness. A majority

Women of the minority community in

of them make their choice on the basis of suggestions from male members of the family, husband and sons. Actualy the women are not politically conscious. It is a well-known fact that the main Political Parties of India do not regard women candidates a much capable and efficient winning candidates like men. For political parties, women of the minority community are good voters but not good candidates.

It is observed that during 1991- 2001,

It is observed that during 1991-2001, women of the minority community in South Kamrup are participating in the last elections in great numbers.

In the present political situation it may be true that manipulation, crime, use of black money, muscle power, false propaganda have become the measures to win election. So, naturally, women of this community in South Kamrup are becoming alternated from politics. A
